Stories will come from Zimbabwe, from Palestine, from Haiti and perhaps other places, too. I hope you will join me as together we explore our advent theme, **Waiting: Stories from Different Contexts**.

The Christmas Pageant

will be held during worship on **Sunday, Dec. 17.** The pageant, entitled **Carriers of the Light**, will include children and youth with assistance from our choir. Thanks to Wendy Ross and Marta Borgstrom for organizing the pageant.

Advent Reflection Opportunities

We will be offering an opportunity for Bethany folks to be walk through Advent with a partner in prayer. We are providing a weekly devotional that people will read and then discuss by phone or in person or some of each – whatever is most convenient. We hope this will enable more people to mark the Advent season in community, especially those who are less eager to venture out on those cold snowy days/evenings! The Devotional guides will be handed out during the Fellowship Hour on Sunday, Dec. 3. We will take the names of those who want to participate, and will match you up with another Bethany person so that your prayer partnering can begin.

An option will be to explore a resource entitled Mary Had a Baby: An Advent Bible Study Based on African American Spirituals. We will begin each session by listening to a spiritual, then we will read the corresponding scripture story and explore a devotional as we consider how the songs spoke to an enslaved people on their journey of faith. We will offer day and evening gathering times. We will meet on Tuesdays, Dec. 5, 12 and 19 from 5:30-6:30 PM and Wednesdays, Dec. 6. 13 and 20 from 10:00 – 11:00 AM. Please join us!

Tuesday afternoon Bible study will use a devotional produced by the UCC Stillspeaking Writers' Group. All are invited to join us each Tuesday at 1:00 PM.

Advent Vespers – **Sunday, Dec. 17** at 4:00 PM. You are invited to attend a quiet late afternoon worship opportunity with soothing music and seasonal readings. Take a brief time away from the busy pace of the season, and seek comfort in God's promises of hope, peace, joy and love.

Sunday, December 24 - Three Worship Services! 10:00 AM, 5:00 PM and 9:00 PM. Please note the earlier time for the first evening service.

At the 10:00 AM service we will share an informal time of stories and song. The 5:00 service is designed especially with children in mind. It is a bit shorter than the later service, but includes the Christmas story from scripture, with carols and the lighting of candles, as well as a special opportunity to help make ready for the arrival of the infant Jesus. Child care will be provided during the 5:00 service. The 9:00 service will include more carols and scripture readings. The choir will sing, Kim will offer a brief meditation and all will participate in the lighting of candles. Come to celebrate Christmas: to hear the story, to sing the carols, to worship God.

New Member Profiles

Last June we received four new members into membership at Bethany Church. In the months since they joined us, they have been busy sharing their gifts with our church community. Here are brief bios on those who joined us in June.

Dave Haberl

What a joy for us all to welcome Dave "officially" into Bethany Church, as a member! Although Dave grew up in Van Buren, Missouri, his mom, one of Beth and Joe Kittel's daughters, grew up in our church and she and her husband were married here. As a result,

Dave was here often, as his family visited, year-in- and year-out. What he likes about Bethany is the sense of community, and his feeling, whenever he comes, that he's being welcomed home by extended family!



After working as a forester in 14 different states (!), Dave took a job in his field, here in Vermont last fall, and is now living in Rochester, with a forester housemate. (I understand there is a "woman-of-interest" in Dave's life, and that she manages a ranch!)

One of the manifestations of his career in forestry is that he is a "hotshot". In case you, like me, don't know what a hotshot is, here's what google has to say! "In the United States, an interagency hotshotcrew (IHC), or simply hotshot crew, is a Type 1 handcrew of 20 firefighters specially trained in wildfire

suppression tactics... As an interagency resource, hotshot crews can be requested to respond to wildland fire incidents in any jurisdiction." Dave was serving in this capacity in a terrible fire several years ago, in the same region in which several hotshots lost their lives. I find it hard to imagine the impact that would have on one. Another facet of his work is as a chainsaw instructor. Dave certifies people who work with the Forest Service as an employee, cooperator or volunteer before they can use crosscut saws and chainsaws. In his present job, he is a pre-sale forester, which means that he lays out timber plots and makes sure all regulations are met, when someone has a contract to buy and log land. He also builds some of the timber sale contracts and puts them out for the bidding process.

Dave's list of hobbies is mind-boggling! His interests include fishing, hunting, sailing (including designing and building a sail-boat rigging for a canoe!), making remote control aircraft, scuba diving, timber sports, and just plain tinkering! Not to mention music; Dave is, as you know, a choir member here at Bethany, and he plays the French Horn, as well. What's more, he is always ready to share the above-mentioned interests with others who share those interests or are interested in trying them. His own self-defining phrase is fun-loving, and you probably knew that without my telling you!

We are especially grateful that Dave is now serving as a Mentor for the Middle School Youth Group. The youth enjoy hearing about Dave's great adventures!

It's great to have you among us, as an official member of your Bethany extended family, Dave! Welcome!

A third sister, Donna, is deceased. He has a son, Benjamin, who graduated from high school last year and is pursuing an apprenticeship in plumbing.

When Peter was young, he helped by leading backpackers who were staying at Harveys Mountain View Inn, and he enjoyed basketball and soccer during high school.

Peter attended Johnson State College, where he graduated with a degree in economics and business. He began a construction company with his father doing Section 8 housing projects, but he mostly enjoyed renovations jobs, as they were like archeological explorations digging into the past to see what might be found within the walls. The builder may have left his signature or other data and calculations written on the boards.



A scaffolding collapse in 1992 broke Peter's foot and back and ended his construction career--and downhill skiing to places such as Colorado. He really enjoys the rural and simple life of the people of Jamaica

because he has visited there more than 10 times. After his life-changing experience, he bought and managed the Hubbard Store in Hancock for 23 years, enduring the effects of 3 floods in 5 years. He has since sold the store and has retired to Randolph, where he volunteers 2 days/week at the gift shop in Gifford Hospital.

Peter attended the Rochester Federated Church as a child and young adult, but drifted away from regular attendance. A challenging time in his life led Peter to reach out for spiritual guidance and support again. He is grateful for the changes he has been able to make in his life with the non-judgmental compassionate support of others. When he moved to Randolph, Peter chose Bethany because of its affirmation of many forms of religious belief, and he is enjoying the people and comradery available here. He feels at home. Shortly after joining the church, Peter accepted the invitation to serve on the Bethany Board of Trustees.
